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

Youth have their say about the future of Lennox

The Lennox Head Strategic Plan 2023-2043 will capture the community vision for the Lennox and Skennars area for the next 20 years. It will outline key actions for Council and the community to guide Council towards achieving the vision.

Council held a meeting in October at the local skate park to ask youth about their hopes and concerns for the future of the local area over the next 20 years. Approximately 50 children showed up to have their say.

Brigid Pearse, Strategic Planner said the following concerns were raised, 'About one third of the kids we spoke to felt that they wouldn't live in Lennox in 20 years because it would be too expensive. Most of the participants felt that the skate park needed expansion, for safety and so everyone can have a go. Also most participants wanted to see some sort of pump track/BMX jumps supported at Williams Reserve.

'More shade around the skate park and seating around the edges of the Reserve were key concerns for most participants. Some participants suggested junior skate and bike area for little kids and all participants agreed that any activities should be close to village shops for access to affordable food.'

Brigid stressed that it was important for young people to share their concerns, 'After all they are the ones who will live out the effects of our long term strategic planning. Younger people don't often actively sign up for Council's engagement activities. It means that planners need to go to where young people are and get their views,' she explained.

Council has also been talking to the local community at listening stalls at the Lennox Market, collecting feedback through Council's new online engagement tools and working through detailed policy issues with a Community Reference Group of around 20 members, who in turn have been sharing information about the strategic plan with their community networks.

Brigid said, 'The next steps are to start drafting the Plan, using the ideas we have heard from all the feedback. The draft Plan is expected to be on public exhibition in the first half of next year. At that stage, the wider community can review the Plan and give further feedback.'

We were very pleased to convene our rescheduled 10 October meeting although B Ward Councillors were unavailable due to an Extraordinary Council meeting.

Street and car park lighting in Cultural Centre precinct

Correspondence will be forwarded to Council outlining concerns raised about the danger inherent with inconsistent lighting. Members reported trips and falls in the Cultural Centre car park, difficulty identifying pedestrians randomly crossing Park Lane and safety concerns when walking on the eastern end of Byron Street.

Wildlife Protection on roadways Members identified a number of possible solutions to remedy increasing wildlife kill and injury on

local roads. Responsibility of owners who permit dogs off-leash to chase and attack wallabies in bushland, forcing them onto the Coast Road, requires positive re-enforcement. Prominent permanent signage in at-risk locations and at fenced wildlife entry points to traverse the road, serve as reminders to the travelling public. Wider mown road verges will assist drivers to sight wildlife. The President encouraged members (and readers) to correspond with B Ward Councillors requesting urgent action.

New guard at the Association Some executive committee members indicated they will vacate their positions in March 2023. We call upon existing members and Lennox Head community to step into these roles which provide a valuable local

connection to Council, State and Federal Governments on a variety of matters affecting the place we call home.

Strategic Urban Growth Areas were reviewed at an Extraordinary Council meeting, resulting in decisions to refine, remove or retain areas which may be subject to employment/light industrial (Ross Lane and Byron Bay Road) or residential development in the future. 
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Nominate heroes Walkley win

Councillors' thoughts; 4WD on Seven Mile Beach

Each month, B Ward Ballina Shire Councillors will have the opportunity to share information on a subject that carries importance to the community. All comments and points of view are those of the author. This month we asked Councillors for their thoughts on 4WD on Seven Mile beach.

Cr Jeff Johnson

I have long pushed for there to be restrictions and better monitoring of 4WD on Seven Mile Beach. My preference would be for a locals-only approach but that hasn't been supported by Council. I also believe that the permits should be restricted to annual passes so that there is a significant reduction in the number of vehicles. An annual permit system would largely remove the '4 wheel drive tourism' aspect that can result in large numbers of vehicles during the school holiday period.

I am a supporter of local families and fisherman being able to access the beach in a responsible way that complies with a strict code of conduct.

The key issues for me are: to reduce the conflict between user groups, ensure that there are no vehicles on the beach during king tides, etc and that no vehicles go on the dunes and that any breaches of the code ie excessive speed or encroaching on the dunes leads to a large fine and the cancellation of the permit.

The technology is now available to monitor vehicle numbers and to remotely lock the access gate when the beach isn't suitable due to king tides, erosion or big surf.

Cr Eva Ramsey

I am all in favor of 4WD beach usage on Seven Mile Beach as a recreational area, it is an iconic part of Lennox which adds to the lay back relaxed feeling of our unique area. Locals and tourists alike utilise Seven Mile Beach, they come knowing they can share a day on a secluded part of the beach, throw out their rug, put up the umbrella, fish, swim, and enjoy the

tranquility it has to offer. For some, such as our disabled community, it is their only access to the beach and the enjoyment of what many of us take for granted.

Take a glance around Australia, there are countless hundreds of beaches around our country that are open to 4WD access, and it works superbly.

It's easy - purchase your permit, register one access on and off monitored by gates or electronic device which records your vehicle registration, or usages against your name.

We as a Council only need to put the correct conditions in place and enforce them. There are sets of usage rules in place across Australia in the 4WD community, some even gazetted.

Cr Kiri Dicker

I've lived a stone's throw from Seven Mile Beach most of my life, so it is an area that I am passionate about protecting. Councils around Australia are beginning to realise the longterm damage that vehicles pose to flora and fauna, including nesting turtles and seabirds, as well as walkers. Therefore it is my firm belief that moving into the future, recreational 4WDing on our beaches needs to be phased out. This should not prevent access by commercial fisherman, emergency vehicles, wildlife rescuers and people with disabilities requiring beach access, but for the average family with a 4WD, it's time to reassess our relationship with our fragile coastline. At a minimum, we need to get rid of one-day permits (accounting for around 80% of all permits). When the State Government closed South Ballina Beach to 4WD-s to prevent widespread destruction by some irresponsible drivers, traffic on Seven Mile Beach increased dramatically. It will continue to increase as 1000s of new lots are built in and around Lennox over the coming decade. There are countless other ways to enjoy our natural environment that are not dangerous and destructive to humans and wildlife.

One curious doctor

One Curious Doctor is a collection of short pieces born out of my experiences working as a GP in the Northern Rivers since 1988. It also includes stories which have their roots in my personal journey as a migrant growing up in 1960s' Sydney, as the descendent of grandparents forced to escape Europe to survive, and as the son of parents who died prematurely from conditions

that modern medicine could not cure.

In 2019, these worlds collided. I was diagnosed with Post Traumatic Stress Disorder. I received this diagnosis as a shock - 'This can't be happening to me. I'm a doctor. Not a patient.' And as a gift 'does this mean I actually get to rest now?'

As the fallout from the trauma of the diagnosis began to settle, I tried to work out how I ended up in this position. Was the PTSD a consequence of vicarious trauma from working as a GP for over 30 years? Did it come from my life-long feelings of being an outsider trying so hard to fit in? Or was it a result of trauma experienced by my parents and grandparents in their search for security across three continents?

Maybe it was all down to my personality type. My nature. Did the qualities which made me a trusted doctor also make me more vulnerable to the inevitable impact of caring for people over many years? I do not yet have answers to these questions. But I am keen to share my ponderings with you.

My hope is that the stories in One Curious Doctor will resonate with those of you who may have had similar experiences. This curious doctor has done his best without always getting things right. I ask you to care for these stories as a kind doctor might care for a new patient with curiosity and compassion. Book launch is at The Book Room in Byron at 6pm on 17 November. One Curious Doctor is also being stocked at The Book Room in Lennox.

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

Margaret Anne Moffat

I was born Margaret Anne Moffat in 1936. I had two sisters and two brothers. I guess growing up in Sydney was a lot different to country life. We were always referred to as the MOFFOS. My first memories were Mum putting up black curtains and newspaper to cover the windows and


me with a Red Cross calico bag over my shoulder during the war and using ration stamps for food and clothing. Coming home from school, convent kids on one side of the street and public school kids on the other side were called Cathos and Pubos but all good friends after school. I went to the same Convent school all my school life, except for one week when I was in 6th class. I was probably 11 years old when I had a row with the Nun and stormed off home. I told Mum I was never going back to that school. Mum's reply was, 'yes you are.' I got around Dad to let me go to the Brown Nuns at Arncliffe. I wasn't there long when one afternoon I saw two Charity Nuns coming down the street (we used to call them pigeons). I ran and hid until they left. It was back to the old school the next day. I guess I was a handful. I loved to tap dance and loved music. At school if there was a concert, I was in it. I got a scholarship to attend St. Mary's College in Sydney for two years but didn't take it as I wanted to earn money. My first job when I was 14 years old was at State Superannuation Board working for an actuary.

In 1956 I was married to Victor Boyd and had three children. We lived at Harbord then bought a house at Engadine where I lived for 13 years. We experienced bushfires in the National Park alongside the railway line. It was too close for comfort.

We then moved to Bexley where my marriage broke down and I later divorced. I was left with the three children on my own and I later met Harry. I wouldn't live with Harry while the children were living at home. We were engaged for 12 years. I guess saying fiancee was better than saying girlfriend at our age. We then bought a house at Panania where Harry was diagnosed with kidney disease and within 12 months was on dialysis which he did himself for five hours locked in the house. I knew I had to leave work so in 1988 we married. Harry was 51 and I was 53. We decided to buy a block of land in Lennox Head and move out of Sydney. Best move ever. We moved into our new home in 1989. The population of Lennox was 1,500.

After a short time Harry got a call to go to Sydney for a transplant which was successful and Harry survived for eight years. During that time we made many friends and played bowls together. They were good times.

I have played bowls in Fiji, Norfolk Island and every state in Australia except Northern Territory. I have played in carnivals with friends and joined bowling group tours. Being on my own bowls has been a great social outlet for me. I have always been a little outspoken and got into trouble all my life for talking too much. At 86 nothing much has changed.

The evening kicked off with a delightful Welcome to Country



With passionate mood, the ocean is your cool address, no placid dreams of the bourgeoise, but wild philosophy, that deepens and gleams in the wet, bold blueness.




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Sangeeta Lee Jones of Glitterati Riot



Sangetta is a local musician, one part lead vocalist of 70s band Glitterati Riot and popular music teacher.

Where were you born, and when did you discover music?

I was born in Perth and then the family moved to Sydney soon after. I have always been passionate about music and I would sing to all the neighbours while on my swing in the backyard. They said they enjoyed it so I had great neighbours.

All my family loved music. I was always singing and my family were very encouraging with all my musical endeavours. At age nine I started studying classical piano. The show *Countdown* was an absolute must and if Dad wanted to watch the cricket or football during *Countdown*, this would be devastating news.

What are your career highlights?

I have completed all the classical piano grades and have an Honours in Contemporary Music, majoring in Voice and Composition. I have an advanced certificate for the Jo Estill vocal technique which is a wonderful technique that really helped to transform my own and my student's voices.

I have most recently worked for over a couple of years as a music tutor at Emanuel College in Ballina, and I taught at Byron High before I left to live in London. Also at that time I was a lecturer at the Northern Rivers Conservatorium in Songwriting, Vocals, Keyboard, Band Ensembles and Stage Craft.

When I was living in London I was the vocal teacher at South Thames College. A real highlight was being chosen to be the presenter and teacher for the English National Opera (ENO) phone app. The ENO were looking to bring the Opera genre to younger audiences and they loved the more holistic approach I do with my vocal teaching.

Recording and performance wise I have made two EPs and an album. The self titled album I wrote, arranged and co-produced and was completed with the talents of 30 musicians. The album covers many genres including art rock, jazz, electronic, and world music influences such as Spanish flamenco and Indian classical. The instruments were as varied as kettle drums and castanets, to Indian tanpura and violins. All the different elements are brought together by an emotive theme, inspired by the way David Bowie does in his Ziggy Stardust album. All the original songs which were initially composed on piano, were debuted at the Starcourt theatre, backed by the music lecturers at the Southern Cross University. The event also featured two music videos that were made from the album played on the big screen. Since then the songs and the two EPs which I had made, later have been toured with my four piece band in Australia, Greece and the UK. We performed regularly in venues throughout London and built a great following, headlining at sought after venues such as Alan McGee's Death Disco at the Notting Hill Arts Club. A big highlight was having a residency at the Edinburgh Fringe Festival where we opened for Tim Minchin at the Gala Opening Night.

How long have you been teaching music?

In Lennox Head I have been teaching since after my return from London, so around late 2015. I teach many adults too, people who have always wanted to sing, learn piano and guitar, or take them up again. Others come to prepare for auditions also such as for the upcoming Mama Mia musical for the Ballina players.

How did the band Glitterati Riot come about?

I was in the musical production for Calamity Jane with the Bangalow Theatre Company and I met Julie Haschemeyer, the other vocalist of the band and she asked me to join. She mentioned a few genres they did and when she said disco, my ears pricked up. From there we all developed a new repertoire choosing songs that all five of us love. It was certainly a departure from my origin but I was open to doing something more light, fun and frivolous. I think after all that has gone on in the world over the last couple of years, many people want to feel that fun and lightness also. Our repertoire has songs from the 70s to now with a dance vibe. We love to dress up in glittery outfits and present a performance.

The event has been running since 2005 and was inspired when Travis Garone, one of the founders of Movember, was working for Quiksilver at the time alongside Ballina Boy, Nat Johnson. They talked one day and said, 'Why don't we do a surf comp? Why don't we do a Morning of the Mo-themed contest that Movember supports?'

The Event wanted to be super respectful to all the *Morning* of the Earth guys, Alby Falzon specifically. So they contacted



Alby and ran past him what they wanted to do, and he gave the idea his blessing. The event wanted to pay homage to those guys and bring it to the modern world.

It's a lot more than just a core surf event. Everything has to be pre-80s, single fins and twin fins, no leg ropes and of course, running a great Mo.



Pioneer profile: Mary Hodgkinson

Mary Hodgkinson arrived in the Lennox district in 1866 one of the area's earliest settlers. Born in London on 23 August 1823, Mary was the daughter of Thomas and Sarah Marshall. The family migrated to Victoria in 1840 and after being declared bankrupt during the 1840s depression, Thomas and his family moved to Geelong. Here Mary met James Hodgkinson and the couple married in 1843. They engaged in farming and, by 1864, owned five stations in the Avoca and Swan Hill districts. However, the mortgages were large and insolvency followed.

Mary and James, and three of their eight children, then moved to North Creek (Lennox). Their property extended

from Lennox Headland to North Creek Road, a total of 1,316 acres. As one of Lennox Head's earliest settlers, conditions would have been challenging for Mary. Planting gardens to grow fruit and vegetables, all whilst rearing children and assisting her husband in constructing a home and clear the land for farming, would have been demanding for Mary.

In 1870 Mary became a 'female collector' for Melbourne botanist Ferdinand von Mueller whose desire to write about Australian flora necessitated the employment of a team of botanical collectors. In return for their labours, Mueller honed their knowledge and skills in botany. Collectors in rural areas, and particularly newly settled areas like North Creek, were particularly valued by Mueller, given the likelihood that they would discover new species.

By 1875 Mary had collected previously unidentified species, included *Eugenia hodgkinsoniae F.Muell*, a rare subtropical Red Lilly Pilly, named for her. Mary was no ordinary pioneering settler. Her apparent intellect, drive and determination to extend her boundaries beyond the confines of home and farm, distinguish her as a woman of independence and self-determination. She should be acknowledged and remembered for her contribution, not only to the region, but to the science of botany.

Acknowledging information contained in Lennox Head Public School Centenary 1882* and the research of Sara Maroske, particularly A taste for botanic science': Ferdinand Mueller's female collectors and the history of Australian Botany.



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Landmarks of Lennox - Lennox Head at war

In April 1918 a Roll of Honour was unveiled to commemorate North Creek and district personnel who had served in the Great War (World War I)¹. At that time six young men were officially listed as killed. The Roll is now located in the Library.

Marking Armistice Day 1918, adjacent to their holiday cottage at Rocky Point, Carsten and Wilhelmina Bulwinkel planted two Norfolk Pine trees, one of which was 'toppled by heavy weather in 1988'².

World War II also impacted Lennox Head. There are oral histories collected by the Heritage Committee of house windows and car lights blacked out³, gas producers to propel vehicles during petrol shortages³, planes from Australian

Anglers Arms

On 16 November 1973 Lennox Head's Hotel, The Anglers Arms, a venture of Barwon Hotels group comprising members of the Rummery family, a friend and a hotel broker, opened on the current site. Accommodation was then a condition of a hotel licence but rooms on the first floor proved overpoweringly hot, bearing the brunt of the western sun and cooking occupants.

and US airforces overhead⁴, lights of Navy ships sweeping the land from the ocean⁵, Japanese from submarines being sighted at Flat Rock accessing fresh water⁶, rationing of goods⁷ and a plane plunging into the ocean off Broken Head⁸.

An Army camp was established near Lake Ainsworth⁹ and Dorothy Thompson recollects air raid shelters built at North Creek Public School. She was fearful Japanese from submarines would come onshore to the Gibbon house by the Lake. Dorothy 'used to get into bed and cover [her] head with a blanket⁹.

After the War, the village became more popular as a holiday destination. Building supplies were in short supply so many iconic beach houses were constructed with repurposed materials from surronding areas.

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








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Ocean rhythms





Spring time is normally the season when dry weather comes and nor-east winds blow, often for days on end. This spring, like the last two has been very different. Under the influence of La Nina and a negative Indian Ocean Dipole our traditional seasons have been reversed. In effect, warm water is being pushed up against Australia from the Pacific and the Indian Oceans and this warm, moist air is creating an incredible wet signal across most of the continent. We've got lush green grass and very few northerlies as a result and plenty of E swell from deep easterly tradewind fetches, as well as more local sources in the Tasman and Coral Seas.

At time of writing, a prolonged E'ly swell event is in progress, with SE winds mostly creating unruly surf across the Lennox and Ballina surf breaks. Constant E'ly swell has continued to keep sandbanks mostly wide and deep. Our south-east facing

coastline really needs a regime of small to medium south swells over autumn and winter to get sand moving and then allow it to settle in close to shore in the best positions for surf. There hasn't been a period like that over the last two La Nina years and so favourable sand formations have been mostly fickle and short-lived. At time of writing a clean day augurs a magic morning at the Point. Medium term is looking very juicy for surf with the BOM releasing a Tropical Cyclone outlook which forecasts more cyclonic activity this summer, especially in the South Pacific where we get quality swells without the weather. Here's hoping Huey bowls them right down the middle of the South Pacific slot with all the islands out of harms way.

Fishing has become productive with a general improvement in water quality across the board. Schools of tailor have become more frequent, either a season that is running drastically later than usual or an earlier than normal run of our Christmas chopper tailor. Either way they are hitting small metal spinners aggressively off the rocks. Flathead have been on the chew around the beach gutters and bottom reaches of the river with the first of the run in tide being best as warm blue water floods back in.

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Kite surfing fundamentals

As the seasons change so do the winds, spring brings the north east sea breezes and we see more kites in the skies and kite surfers in the ocean and local waterways. Kite surfing is a very exciting sport, letting the winds power and energy pull you along on a board. It's truly an incredible feeling.

How often have you seen a kite surfer way out to sea and wondered wow, are they going to be able to make it back?

Kite surfing can be quite a time consuming learning process. There are skills that need to be mastered before you hit


the water otherwise you might find yourself in a spot of bother. The best way to start is with a trainer kite and a coach, on a big open beach with no obstacles in the way. The most common misunderstanding is that you have to be super strong to fly a kite, it's actually a combination of co ordination and technique. Wearing a harness around your waist takes the pressure off your arms and enables you to lean back into the harness like abseiling.

Once you master basic skills like the wind window and kite handling, letting go of the bar etc you can move onto bigger kites and start to discuss the board riding skills with your coach. From here a flat-water spot is a great place to progress, lucky for us the Northern Rivers has some amazing kite surfing Locations.




Two weekends of Second Hand Saturday



Exploring Human Design

Human Design is a system based on the time and place of your birth. It's a combination of astrology, the iChing, Kabbalah and Vedic philosophy which sounds rather esoteric. But personally, I've found it freakishly accurate and most clients tell me they feel very seen and understood.

It's like a self knowledge system and is so multilayered that even though I've been studying and experimenting with Human Design for five years now, there's always another layer to learn. This makes it an incredibly in-depth tool for self discovery.

In human design terms, we are one of four types (and one sub type). These are:

Generators and manifesting generators.

Generators make up around 70% of the population and are here to build, and create. But most importantly, they are here to respond. They know when they are operating as their design when they feel satisfied versus frustrated.

Projectors

Projectors are the guides. They make up about 20% of the population and are here to deeply recognise others, master systems and see more efficient ways of doing things. Projectors are here to be invited and recognised and when they wait for the correct invitation their theme is success or bitterness.

Manifestors

Are the metaphorical fire starters. They make up around 9% of the population and are here to initiate and inform. They are the rulers of old. Here to do things their way and to make shit happen. If they aren't initiating and informing they may find themselves angry, instead of feelings of peace.

Reflectors

Are like intergalactic beings running on their own planet. They make up 1% of the population and are really here to reflect the health of a community. They are very connected to the lunar cycle so it's important that they give themselves plenty of time to make decisions (like a full month). If they are patient and wait, they'll find themselves pleasantly surprised, but if not it they may hit up against disappointment.

If you'd like to explore further, open your podcast app of choice and search for Rock Your Mic Right - my last season was all about the basics of human design.

This year North East Waste and Ballina Shire Council encourage everyone to continue to look further than their kerbside, take action and find out what can be recycled and reused beyond their bins,' Karen says.

NE Waste highlights that it's easy to recycle more than just the usual paper, cardboard, glass, hard plastics, and steel and aluminium cans that belong in our yellow lid recycling bins. Household batteries, paints, oils, gas bottles, fluoro bulbs and smoke detectors are all accepted at the Ballina Community Recycling Centre

and it's FREE for quantities of up to 20 litres or 20 kilos.

The centre is located at 167 Southern Cross Drive, Ballina and is open 8am – 4pm every day except public holidays.

For small quantities of some problem wastes, like household batteries and mobile phones, printer cartridges and x-rays, residents have access to council's five satellite Community Recycling Stations (CRS) located at Ballina library, Council's Customer Service Centre, Lennox Head Community Centre, Alstonville Cultural Centre and the Salvage Shed Tip Shop.

Canines and Coastal Paths

I've been walking a friend's pooch on the track between the Point and Sharpes Beach, while she's been on holidays, and I've been delighted to see most dog-owners walking their dogs on-leash. This time last year, when I did the same thing, dogs were literally running amok. It's a welcome change and maybe it's just in time.

Council receives many complaints regarding off-leash dogs and there's growing pressure to charge wrong-doers with a hefty \$330 fine. Some complaints relate to dogs harassing people, biting people (and other dogs) and, unfortunately, killing wildlife. There's even been talk of closing some off-leash areas due to irresponsible activity. If you're unsure where you can exercise your dog, see Council's webpage: ballina.nsw.gov.au/exercising-your-dog.

We can't blame dogs for doing what comes naturally, and we love seeing them having fun, but it's our responsibility as owners to ensure our canine friends are well behaved. Even small, non-aggressive dogs have been seen with blood-soaked birds in their mouths. While surfing the Point a few years ago, the early morning crew watched in horror as a wallaby fell from the very top of the Point. This was no accident or misstep. A large unleashed dog was clearly seen barking at the cliff edge watching it fall. Its owner was nowhere to be seen.

As our coastal rainforests slowly regenerate, there will inevitably be a corresponding increase in wildlife. Populations of ground-dwelling birds like the noisy pitta, unseen for 150 years, are returning. Migrating birds like spangled drongos and dollar birds also find refuge there, as well as seasonal birds like wonga and wompoo pigeons. These birds often feed on the ground and require protection from dogs. Wallabies and bandicoots require the same courtesy.

Wild animals in the heath also need our protection; slow moving reptiles are often killed by free-roaming dogs. Birds nesting on the dunes, like pied oystercatchers and little terns, also require protection. If you exercise your dog on Seven Mile Beach via the 'horse track' or the 4WD-access track, please keep it on-leash until you get onto the beach so it can't roam or leave its scent (crap and pee) without you knowing. Even the presence of a dog can stress out birds by disturbing nesting routines.

If you walk your canine along the coastal paths or in the heath, keeping it on-leash is mandatory. If you walk your dog along Seven Mile Beach, consider keeping it on-leash to reduce its impact on seabirds, crabs and other animals. And please pick up your pooch's poo.

If we're responsible, considerate dog-owners, access to these areas will be retained. If we're not, we'll lose that access. There's ample space for wildlife and dogs if we do the right thing.

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Environment matters

Most people will have noticed the cypress trees at the back of Williams Reserve. But did you know they are a threatened ecological community in NSW?

Coastal Cypress Pine Forest in the NSW North Coast Bioregion is listed as endangered under the NSW Biodiversity Conservation Act 2016. It is characterised by a closed to open canopy of Coastal Cypress Pine (*Callitris columellaris*), which may sometimes be mixed with eucalypts, wattles, sheoak or banksia and/or rainforest trees. The understorey of shrubs, sedges and herbs is typically open to sparse with the ground sprinkled with pine needles.

Coastal Cypress Pine Forest is restricted to the NSW North Coast bioregion, in particular the Tweed, Byron, Ballina, Richmond Valley and Clarence Valley local government areas.

The key threats to the Williams Reserve Coastal Cypress Pine Forest are weeds and garden escapes, dumping of rubbish and garden refuse, cars driving over and parking on and near trees, and other uses, such as construction of bike tracks.

Lennox Head Landcare worked in the Williams Reserve Coastal Cypress Pine Forest in the early 2000s but no work is currently undertaken. At that time, the group was successful in getting a gate installed near the scout hall to reduce cars accessing the area and fenced off an area of forest near the scout hall. This reduced some of the impacts to the vegetation community.

There is very little recruitment of new cypress trees in this small area of forest and, given its small size and location in the middle of the urban area, its days may well be numbered. Most of the trees in the forest are mature and may be approaching senescence, or the end of their natural life. Ballina Shire Council is currently looking at measures to help extend the life of this pine forest remnant.

Next time you are wandering through this rare and beautiful example of Coastal Cypress Pine Forest, take some time to enjoy it and please think about how you can help to conserve it.



Pet photo tips

We all know how much our pets move, its impossible to get them to keep still sometimes, even with the best trained dogs.

I almost exclusively have my camera set to burst mode even if I am taking portraits. This means that the pictures will be taken continuously while the shutter is pressed. With any kind of moving object, this by far increases your chances of getting a good shot. You can then go through, pick the best ones and delete the rest. There will always be some blurry ones, but with a bit of practice you might be able to get some good action shots.

I also use the same principle with my camera phone. For the iPhone users out there, you can activate the burst mode, by pressing and holding the shutter release and sliding it to the left of the screen. Alternatively hold down the up button of the volume on the side of the phone.

Get their attention

Always have treats on hand. This will be different for all pets, but whatever your furry friend loves will help you get their attention. Most dogs are food driven, so I usually carry some chicken with me and hold it above my camera to get them to look into the lens. This is also a good way of getting them used to the camera. You can even enlist the help of someone else to hold the item to get them to focus in the right spot.

Other dogs are toy driven, so a well positioned ball or frisbee will also do the same thing. With some animals, a noise can be the best option. I find this is particularly effective with cats and puppies. If you are lucky you might even get the much sought after head tilt portrait, just make sure you have a nice background and you are on to a winner.



What's new in pet therapy options?

I thought I would take a moment to let pet owners know of a few new prescription medications that have recently become available for the treatment of specific problems in dogs and cats. Its nice when some newer options become available that can make treatment of specific conditions safer and more effective for a patient, as well as more convenient and affordable to the owner.

Here's a few of those interesting and brilliant new products than can help.

Stelfonta- This is an injectable drug which is specifically designed to destroy canine Cutaneous Mast Cells Tumours. These cancers are the most common skin cancers seen in dogs. They may be fatal in the long term if not surgically removed and may be followed up with chemotherapy. Sometimes however, surgery is either not an option due to cost or the position of the tumour. Stelfonta is an injectable drug that is given directly into the tumour and causes rapid destruction of the mass over several weeks. 75% of these tumours respond to a single injection. It's a bit more complex than just a quick jab, but its a wonderful option for treating a common life-threatening issue and can often help avoid major surgery.

Cytopoint- Cytopoint is a monoclonal antibody that interferes with some of the immune mechanisms responsible for intense itching in atopic dogs. It's given as a subcutaneous injection every four to eight weeks as soon as a dog starts with the characteristic signs of atopy (or allergies to inhaled allergens like pollens). Atopy is the most common cause of intensely itchy dogs. These patients typically have seasonal flareups of ear problems, itchy skin, hot spots, itchy feet, skin infections, itchy butts etc etc. Its a constant source of misery and expense for owners and dogs. Cytopoint can literally be a life saver in many of these dogs. Cytopoint has virtually no side effects, its specific only for atopy and only for dogs.

Barazone- Barazone is a new topical leave-on skin conditioner that contains a topical corticosteroid that remains within the skin for a week after application and acts


locally to greatly reduce itching and inflammation due to contact allergies (and atopy to some extent). It is non-greasy, and can be used as a total body treatment or used more sparingly to target specific areas (like bellies and feet). Due to its topical application and local activity, systemic side effects are very unlikely .

Neptra- is an ear medication that is applied by your vet in a consultation or a procedure (after appropriate diagnosis of course) and, once massaged into the ear canal, provides three to four weeks continuous treatment of the problem. Neptra contains a long acting anti-inflammatory steroid, a broad spectrum antibiotic and a broad spectrum antifungal. It is effective against a large variety of cantankerous and persistent pathogens

Solensia- like Cytopoint for dogs this is a monoclonal antibody treatment, so an immunotherapy rather than a drug as such. It specifically treats the pain of Arthritis only in cats. Solensia doesn't resolve the arthritic degeneration of the joints, but by managing the pain of arthritis it can significantly improve the quality of life of the patient. It is given by a subcutaneous injection under the skin once a month and can take a month to start working. Side effects are unlikely and when they do occur are generally mild and transient.

Feline-Specific Tick Antiserum- up until now cats had to be given the same antiserum for tick paralysis as dogs. Dog antiserum is manufactured using canine plasma, so it carries a significantly greater risk of causing an anaphylactic reaction if given to feline patients. This is usually managed well by various intensive care precautions, but occasionally these precautions fail and a cat can die of anaphylactic shock, let alone the tick paralysis. There is a new feline specific antiserum coming onto the market this spring and it will greatly decrease the risks for feline patients. This is great news. We will be stocking this antiserum and using it in all our feline patients from now on.

Ticks are still an absolute horror. The Emergency centres are overflowing with paralysed and dying pets which have not been on appropriate tick prevention.

This is a bloke chosen to represent Australia 21 times and NSW 20 times and was captain of the Australian Rugby league team in 1981, all in a senior Rugby League career spanning 14 years. What he was doing galloping around with a team of second division donkeys like us, I couldn't tell ya. But it was the greatest Rugby League day Lennox ever saw. Rogers had become publican of the Anglers arms Hotel

and he just wanted to be part of the community, I guess.

It was around the 60 minute mark when footy legend Steve Rogers yelled at me to stand between the centers. I thought I was just in the way. I was just thrilled to be on the same team as this legend. But then he yells, 'now bloody run' the ball lands in my lap. I stumble a few steps, trip and fall over the try line. It was a drop in the ocean for Steve Rogers, but it was a tidal wave for Steve Walsh.

Us Dolphins got our backsides kicked by Wardell that day. Supposedly it was in front of 4,000 people, I can't confirm or deny this. I was way too busy trying to tell anyone who would listen about the try I'd just scored off a Steve Rogers' pass. It was certainly the day the greatest shark of all played with the Lennox Dolphins.
















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
