## Upgrade update



Ballina Shire Council's project to rejuvenate Lennox Village is progressing. Works are now focusing on the village's central hub and the project's staging has been consolidated with the goal to complete the majority of works in December 2022.

Throughout September Ballina Street was closed to improve site access and enable Council to accelerate works in the central hub of Lennox Village. Activities focused on footpath paving works, road reconstruction and road paving in the central hub.

Following recent consultation with Lennox village business operators, Council will complete Stage 3 (central hub) and Stage 4 (northern Ballina Street) simultaneously over the next four months.

Stage 4 along the northern section of Ballina Street commenced 1 September 2022 and will be completed at the same time as Stage 3 (central hub), which is also underway. Ballina Shire Council is pleased to announce the Festival and Event Sponsorship Program for 2023/24 is now open.

The program is now in its 12th year and has been a huge success for community festivals and events. It offers event organisers the opportunity to apply for sponsorship from a pool of approximately \$120,000 of funding for their festival or event for the 2023/2024 financial year.

Council's Mayor, Sharon Cadwallader said, 'It's important we secure this funding for event organisers well before the start of the 2023/24 financial year, which is why we call for applications quite early on in the process. Event organisers will know the outcome of their application by December 2022.'

There are several eligibility criteria, including: the applicant needs to hold adequate public liability insurance, the total cost of the festival/event must be more than \$20,000, and the festival/event must be held in the Ballina Shire. #### Aircraft noise

Council's August meeting undertook to correspond with Air Services Australia to conduct an airspace review focusing on appropriate noise abatement measures and with airlines informing them of residents' ongoing concerns with requests to deploy measures minimising aircraft noise where possible. Correct protocols for reporting noise complaints will be circulated regularly. Our Association will initiate contact at a Federal level with those who have responsibility for aviation issues.

## A business/housing development at 61 Ballina Street

DA 2022/146 includes a proposal for a three storey section facing Rayner Lane incorporating a rooftop terrace one metre over the 9metre height limit. Members' concerns on a number of aspects were forwarded to Council with members encouraged to make individual submissions.

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## Councillors' thoughts; most pressing issues faced

Each month, B Ward Ballina Shire Councillors will have the opportunity to share information on a subject that carries importance to the community. All comments and points of view are those of the author. This month we asked Councillors for their thoughts on the most pressing issue facing Lennox today.

#### **Cr Kiri Dicker**

The most pressing issue facing Lennox today is the need to protect our environment in the face of rapid growth and development. Almost all of us moved here for the same reason, the village lifestyle and coastal amenity. Growth is inevitable, yet our community is at risk of being loved to death. Our waterways are choking, and our biodiversity is under constant threat from degenerative farming practices and inappropriate development.

There is no simple solution to the environmental crisis we are facing, but we are not going to fix it by using the same thoughts and actions that got us into this mess in the first place. Change does not come about because a few people do things perfectly, it happens when every single one of us commits to changing our behaviour in small ways. We need to consume less, recycle more, embrace renewable energy, walk and ride instead of drive, get more engaged in our communities and the world around us. It's never too late to turn things around.

#### **Cr Eva Ramsey**

Like many other coastal areas Lennox is being loved to death. Completing our Lennox Head Strategic Plan 2023-2043 is at this present stage I think the most prominent issue facing Lennox.

Encouraging people to have input into our new Lennox Head Strategic Plan 2023-2043, with a 20-year horizon. Personal input is a vital gauge that is crucial for the community and future generations with resolutions based on community feedback. Therefore every person has a chance to contribute to that visualisation.

Lennox Head faces numerous pressing issues at present: future population growth, how we house the migration, creating jobs, taking care of our environment, biodiversity, cultural heritage, protecting our character and lifestyle, linking our stunning hinterland villages and copious others.

I take my elected position very seriously and try to make fair and equitable decision on our future for everyone. Therefore, please don't miss your chance to do the same and mould your community's future by visiting yoursayballina.com.au

Our Lennox coastal lifestyle means so much, time moving just a little bit slower, activities being done at a leisurely pace, strangers smiling and striking up a friendly conversation, knowing your community is there for you, we have a sense of belonging. The most critical issue now is sharing your input into for future.

#### **Cr Jeff Johnson**

A key issue for Lennox is the future of the school. There has been a dramatic increase in the population over the last 5 - 10 years with a baby boom and the release of a number of new residential areas. This additional population has put a tremendous strain on the Lennox Head Public School. There are currently at least 13 demountable classrooms which take up approximately one third of the former playground. In 2018 construction of up to seven new classrooms was supposed to start but this has now been cancelled due to the discovery of Aboriginal artefacts on the site and the realisation that the site is too small to meet current and future needs.

The situation with the School highlights a clear failure from the NSW Government to adequately plan for and deliver key infrastructure that our community needs. The proposed seven new classrooms were already inadequate five years ago. The NSW Government is currently looking at an alternative school site. Whether the existing School will be used as either an Infants or Primary School in the future is still not clear.

## Seeking regional health solutions

I continue to raise in Parliament the fact that people living in rural and regional areas have for too long drawn the short straw when it comes to health outcomes and services.

Staff pay and conditions, and under-resourcing are at the heart of the problem. Difficulty in attracting qualified personnel and insufficient clinical resources were revealed to be at crisis point in regional areas like ours during the COVID pandemic, and starkly uncovered in the aftermath of this year's flooding disasters.

Right now, staff shortages of nurses and midwives in the Northern Rivers are serious. Many who were flood-affected have moved to Queensland where they can earn more and work in better conditions with mandated nurse-to-patient ratios. Our local nurses employed full-time are working alongside 'agency' casual nurses who get paid about \$10 per hour more than they do. Affordable housing for nurses, midwives, allied health staff and hospital administrative staff is an issue across the Northern Rivers.

Our small number of state local ambulance personnel and paramedics spend most of their shifts taxiing non-critical

patients to the Gold Coast. Or they're transporting them between hospitals because of simple problems like Ballina Hospital not being resourced to employ an on-call radiologist. Having such a specialist available would allow for the expensive CT scan at Ballina hospital to be used outside of business hours or on weekends.

Once our ambos take non-critical patients to other hospitals, they may have to wait for many hours for the Emergency Departments to be able to take carriage of their patient. This could be remedied with a roll-out of the Patient Transfer system that is in place in the Sydney metropolitan area that transfers patients who do not need a time-critical emergency ambulance.

Our front-line nurses, midwives, paramedics and hospital staff tell me regularly that better pay that keeps up with inflation, improved nurse-to-patient ratios, applying Sydney's patient transfer system across the Northern Rivers, and employing on-call radiologists at hospitals that perform CT scans, would make a big difference for our communities.

We also respond to a variety of other local needs such as house fires, support for SES and Fire Brigade naming just a few.

## Safety lights campaign

A fall at home can have terrible consequences for an elderly person, their family and the community. The Rotary Safety Night Lights for Seniors national information campaign will share a critical community health message – promoting fall prevention and the value of automatic night lighting within the home for older people.

Causes of falls can be both health and hazard - one of these may be poor lighting. The likelihood of falls may be reduced with a simple LED night light that provides a soft glow and either comes on automatically when it's dark (dusk to dawn) or illuminates when movement is detected.

The Rotary Club of Lismore West is preparing a nationwide community information campaign promoting safety night lights and fall awareness for seniors and they would love your involvement. They encourage people to get active, get informed and purchase a simple, automatic night light for themselves and others. To help get night lights and falls prevention into people's homes, they have liaised with a national retailer to have a tailor-made Rotary Safety Lights for Seniors 10-day pop-up display staffed by Rotarians, and carry a range of quality night lights and falls awareness information in all their stores, nationwide.

#### My Life story by Audrey Dungar

I was born August 1929 to parents who were a farming family. I had a sister and two brothers. We were typical country kids and walked to school two miles away. The school was a small two teacher school and of an afternoon there would be 10-12 kids walking home together and fighting. We had to make our own fun and played rounders, walked, and swam in the creek that ran through our property. There was a hill and we slid down it on a piece of roofing tin. It's a miracle we didn't hurt ourselves.

We had no electricity, no fridge, washing machine etc. The lorry that came to pick up the cream from the dairies brought blocks of ice for the ice chests. The butcher, baker and grocer from Lismore called and took orders and returned with the orders. Light was from kerosene lamps with the globes changed every few days.

In 1939 the second World War started. I was 10 years old. We all had ration tickets for everything – food, petrol, clothes etc. Because we had a farm we had our own milk, cream, veggies and eggs. We used to make our own butter, beating the cream with a egg beater (my job). How I hated to make it.

At 11 years old I started high school in Lismore 15 miles away. I caught the bus at 7.30am and returned home 4.45pm – a long day.

When I left high school I had six months at home and Dad decided it was time I went to work. I commenced work at McLeans' General Store in the office. The wages were 15 shillings and 11 pence per week and I paid 10 shillings a week board. After 12 months I applied for a job as a book keeping machinist with Lismore City Council and stayed there until six months after I married, at four pounds per fortnight.

My sister Marg, friend Nola and I decided to rent a bedsitter as we were tired of boarding. It had three beds in one room, and a kitchenette with a small oven. We'd take it in turns in winter to turn the stove on. We rode to work on our push bikes or walked if we had a flat tyre. The buses went out to the country dances, kitchen teas and we'd attend balls in our ball gowns etc. Life was much fun. This was where we'd meet our future husbands. I still have some of the gifts from my kitchen tea.

In 1950 I married Charlie. He had been in the Air Force for five years in the Middle East and had saved his money (two shillings a day) so he had built a house for us in Lismore, where we lived. He was a cream grader and tester with Foley Bros Factory, and, as I said, I worked at Lismore City Council.

When Charlie returned from the war, he worked at the Lismore Post Office but hated it. He always wanted to be a farmer, so we sold the house and bought a 300-acre farm five miles from my parents at Georgica. What a shock. There was severe drought; the house was 100 years old, white ants had been in it, it had a fuel stove, a copper to boil the clothes and hundreds of rabbits. Our two boys were born while we lived at Georgica. We didn't have money to pay labour, so Charlie and I milked 80 cows night and morning. We were up at 4.30 in the morning, seven days a week. We were communityminded, played tennis and lawn bowls, attended meetings and became president, secretary or treasurer of all the different associations.

The boys attended the same school at Jiggi that I did but rode bikes to school or sometimes their ponies. We decided that because we couldn't take our boys to sports they had to go to Boarding School at Woodlawn. We were allowed to visit them every second Sunday, so I would cook up enough food to feed them and their mates. Those kids still keep in touch with me.

In 1970 Charlie and I decided to go to Japan for Expo. What an amazing country, the bullet train, people etc. We went on a Dutch ship, the Twangi, crewed by Chinese. Our cabin boy said to me, 'There was a big typhoon between Taiwan and Hong Kong, missy be very sick'. Not only was I sick, but so was he; we didn't see him for three days – what a terrifying time. When we came home, we finished dairying, thank goodness and turned the property into beef cattle.

By 1977 we retired to Lennox Head. A friend asked me to work at the *Northern Star* office in Ballina. Unfortunately, after I'd been there for 10 months, Charlie had a heart attack, and the Dr advised me to give up work to look after him. I had played bowls at East Lismore Club, so I transferred to Lennox, where I have spent the last 43 years and still play.

Charlie died in 2000, and I met Bill eight years later on a bowls trip. We became friendly and he loved travelling so we went to New Zealand, Canada and Alaska, England, Scotland, Ireland and Wales, France and on the Ryan River Cruise.

My latter years have been enriched by my membership in the Lennox Head Probus Club. I enjoy our friendship, our speakers and excursions to many interesting places each month.

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## At home with artist Melissa Wright

Melissa was born with art in her blood.

Raised in Philadelphia, USA, with both sets of grandparents as artists, creativity was encouraged from an early age. 'I was the youngest child and therefore left to my own devices. I had much freedom, so I would be gone all day long in the woods, playing and creating objects from sticks and stones. I was always very hands-on. When we visited my grandmother at her beach house, I would hike into the clay fields, collect fossilised shark teeth, and make cool things. Our family didn't have much money, so my siblings and I learnt to create our enjoyment,' Melissa explains.

Unsurprisingly, at age 18, she left home to study art in Oakland, California. It was the 70s and as Melissa reminisces, 'a fun time to be at a cool independent art school.'

With a love for blues and roots music, Melissa frequented the blues clubs with her sketchbook, where she found herself sitting on stage sketching famous musicians such as BB King, Johnny Lee Hooker and Elton John.

'I've sketched so many extraordinary people. I have hundreds of drawings; I loved drawing so much. If a musician were playing, I would go. It was unreal; I would sketch on bar coasters and napkins. I remember one gig of Bruce Springsteen, before he was famous, walking off stage

because everyone was talking through his set. Can you imagine?'

Melissa went on to finish art school with a degree in printmaking, drawing and teaching before she married and moved to the Southern Hemisphere. Today her Lennox home is adorned with art, trinkets, and sculptures. Each item is symbolic of a story and handmade by herself or another artist. 'Every object has a real story for me. I know where each item came from; there is a history to many of them. I love stuff. I have done so since childhood when I would visit my grandmother's 19th-century house in Massachusetts.' She recalls, 'It was a grand three-storey house with a widow's walk up top. Every room was jam-packed and full of stuff. She would welcome us with a scavenger hunt which would take place through the rooms. I still have most of the gifts I found. I guess I've loved stuff since then.'

Melissa's items are a collection of objects found or gifted from garage sales, markets, travels and galleries. Amongst her curious collection, one can discover tribal masks, Day of the Dead dolls, traditional Chinese cricket homes, Nordic mermaids and religious iconography.

Her inspiration for the female form is strongly evident within her home. 'I love the nuances of a woman's flexible lifegiving


body. We are the most amazing creatures in the universe. In my art I have my woman doing unusual things like dancing in front of the moon. I also carved a piece which honours my girlfriends who have battled breast cancer,' she says.

The largest work to enrich her house is an oil painting by Northern Rivers artist Camilla Connolly. A striking and moody self-portrait of the artist titled *Girl in the Striped Pyjamas*.

'I fell in love with this the moment I saw it. Camilla had a hard life as a prostitute in Sydney's Kings Cross and suffered from debilitating addictions. She came up to the Buttery Rehab Centre to recover. I bought this at an auction. There is something about her sitting there twisting her fingers and thinking; the little smirk on her face hints at happiness in the darkness. I love that it is worrying but full of hope.'

Beyond Melissa's living quarters, she houses her studio containing her etching press, where she continues to printmake and sculpt her smaller pieces.

Recently Melissa has become hugely inspired by and joined a New Zealand collective that sculpture stone. New Zealand was once called home by Melissa and is a country she adores. 'It is hard working on big pieces. Stone sculpture is such a different art experience. With stone, you take everything away instead of adding to it like in printmaking. I have always loved three-dimensional work; I've always loved using my hands,' she says.

'My Granddaughter has formed her own stories for my objects and I let her draw all over the floor in chalk,' she says. ## Landmarks of Lennox - dances and parties

In early 1900s, weekly dances in Jack Meaney's barn on North Creek Road drew people from around the area, with some in their finery arriving on horseback<sup>1.</sup>

Construction of a hall on the waterfront at Ross Park in the early 1930s<sup>2</sup> gave the fledgling village another venue, not just for dances but church services, parties and meetings. During WWII, soldiers camping around Lennox attended the dances, with Clavan's Orchestra<sup>3</sup> or Clark's band – piano, drums and violin or piano accordion.<sup>4</sup>

Construction of the United Church Hall in Rutherford Street in 1951 was welcomed, hosting dances, church services, weddings and concerts.

#### Lennox Head Bowling Club

On 19 October 1959 a group of 52 men and women met to discuss forming a lawn bowls club. The Men's Club formed immediately and the Women's Club in February 1960. Lease of land was agreed by Tintenbar Shire Council at the rate of one shilling [10 cents] per annum, 'payable only if demanded'<sup>1</sup>.

If walls could talk, the Recreation Hall, converted in 1962 by Tintenbar Shire Council from the tennis club house on the edge of Williams Reserve, would have had stories to tell. It became the social centre of the village with dances, balls, parties, football celebrations, fashion parades and indoor bowls.

In the 1990s, Lennox Head Bowling Club provided a venue for events, some involving 'mature' citizens behaving in unusual ways.

The Community and Cultural Centre since 2011 has been a bonus for private parties, conferences, dances and performances by well known artists.

On 9 December this year The Centenary Ball, with swing music by Well Swung Daddies, will mark 100 years of Lennox Head. (see ad pg2)

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

## Ocean rhythms

Well, it's finally been made official, we are now entering a third consecutive La Nina summer, with all that entails. On the positive there is enhanced swell production from the east as South Pacific and Coral Sea tradewinds get a boost. On the negative there is increased chance of more destructive flooding, fish kills and sand banks getting knocked out by storm swells. On balance, the Northern Rivers, and particularly the Richmond River catchments and towns built on these catchments, need another La Nina like a hole in the head. As a slight glimmer of hope, leading long range weather models do show the pattern breaking down over summer, which may ameliorate some of the worst effects which tend to occur late summer, early autumn. The La Nina pattern, with the high pressure belt moving at a more southerly latitude suppressed the normal August westerlies, and as result there were quite a few fun days of surf with light winds most of the day. Sandbanks were still only average or below across most spots, mostly given another hiding by an unruly low which brought rain and a large swell across the Fathers Day weekend. The one positive for a La Nina pattern from spring into summer, is less north-east winds, with high pressure remaining further south increasing the odds for more S to SE winds.

With a bit of luck, we'll see more settled conditions coming through spring which will allow the inshore sand-bars to stabilise and open up the number of surf spots working. The few places that do have good sand have been very crowded.

Fishing has finally started to improve across the area. Beaches have fished reasonably well with bream the most consistent catch. Tailor have remained scarce, with better catches south at Iluka/Yamba and north from Brunswick to the Tweed. The real improvement has come in the river, with baitfish showing up in good numbers, mostly herring. That has seen the normal spring flathead fishing season start to fire up. Numbers have become more consistent as weather has slowly warmed up with dark, muddy bottoms being favoured due to the extra warmth. Regulations have changed in NSW, with fishers now being required to release all fish over 70cm with a bag limit of five fish. The lower limit is 36cm. Hopefully that will see flathead stocks rebound in NSW. It's likely we will see further restrictions on jewfish in the near future, with that stock still in trouble in NSW waters.

That's all for this month. Until next month, tight lines and tubular visions.





# An unusual story of snakes and ladders

A month ago while Landcaring up on The Point I came across a python slithering through the undergrowth. I was a little surprised because it was a cold August morning with an icy westerly blowing and snakes generally overwinter throughout the cooler months. Unusual, I thought, but maybe it was hungry.

A couple of weeks later I saw another python with a bandicoot-sized lump in its belly. The days had warmed up so I wasn't so surprised. What was surprising, however, were its climbing habits. Some snakes can climb ladders, but this one was attempting to scale a three-metre Colorbond shed wall. Unusual, I thought, but maybe it was more talented than I believed.

I've seen small pythons, and other snakes, climb brick walls by zig-zagging along the mortar grooves. But I'd never seen a python scale a wall without any leverage and this python was big, three metres big, and thick too. It started on a corner of the shed and slowly meandered around each side, its belly muscles gripping the tiny gap between the horizontal corrugations and the external cover piece. Unusual, I thought, and clever; these were its leverage points.

When the python's head was about a metre off the ground its bandicoot-sized bulge was about to go vertical. This'll be interesting, I thought 'it won't be able to use the bulging belly muscles for grip; it's too fat.' But just as the bulge left ground, the back half of the snake moved about 300 millimetres away from the corner. Very unusual, I thought; what is it doing?

As the python moved higher, its back end stiffened to act like an angled support, becoming in effect a brace, another type of leverage. Intrigued as I was, I couldn't help thinking: at some stage, it's going to run out of leverage. And that's exactly what happened. With only its head to get up and over the gutter it fell to the ground with a thud. 'Not so unusual,' I thought, 'maybe snakes do need ladders, of some sort, after all.'

It's that time of year again. Snakes and other reptiles are emerging and love warm pavements, so take care particularly when walking or riding the coastal paths or driving on the roads. And for the safety of wildlife and your dog, please keep your pooch on a leash.

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

# Environment matters

By now, you should have seen or heard that Ballina Shire Council is updating the Lennox Head Community Aspirations Strategic Plan 2002 and Lennox Head Structure Plan 2004. As part of that process, council is conducting a comprehensive program of community engagement to prepare the new Lennox Head Strategic Plan 2023-2043.



One of the community engagement activities for the plan is the appointment of a Community Reference Group (CRG). The CRG was formed by an expression of interest process completed earlier this year and is comprised of about 20 members of the community representing various groups and interests including Landcare, the Residents Association, the Heritage Committee, the Sporting Association, the School and Preschool, etc.

We have been meeting monthly since June to discuss the key themes for the plan agreed on at our first meeting. The key themes include: environmental heritage and climate change, new growth and roads, local character; cultural heritage; movement and connection; open and natural spaces. At each meeting Council planners and other staff provide background and future planning related to the theme we are discussing and the group then brainstorms issues and opportunities. All our input is recorded and will be considered in the plan. Our meetings will extend up to October.

In addition to the CRG, Council planners are meeting with various stakeholder groups and conducting drop in sessions around Lennox Head. They have also launched an interactive tool that anyone can use to add comments to a location. The tool uses a map to collect information that you can enter by dropping a pin, adding a comment, and uploading photos to express your thoughts. Everything you post will be public so other members of the community can view it.

It was great to see our local Councilor, Kiri Dicker, recently raise a motion to address Council's policy relating to balloons at events on public land and at Council-owned facilities. It was unanimously supported by all that Council:

• prohibit the release of helium balloons (effective immediately); and

• from 1 January 2023, prohibit the use or supply of all types of balloons, where all, or part, of the event occurs outside. This action has also been taken by other NSW Councils to


counter State regulations that still allow up to 20 balloons to be released at one time, an activity considered littering just across the border in Queensland.

Balloons may seem like a fun thing but they pose a big risk to our environment and marine life – which mistake spent balloons for food and they can get caught up in balloon strings. As a coastal village with already threatened seabirds and turtles any move to protect them should be celebrated (without balloons).

And don't be taken in by manufacturers' claims that some balloons are 100% biodegradable – the term 'biodegradable' just means that a product will break down into its base components through biological processes, but there is no timeframe. Things that take years to degrade, and kill marine life in the meantime, can be labelled as biodegradable. They are even worse than some regular plastics, as they degrade into microplastics, which are ingested into the food chain and also impact on human health.

There are many other creative ways to decorate and commemorate events and avoid polluting our region. Try:

- for a kids' party use bubbles, paper pom poms, colourful flags, banners, pin wheels, streamers, kites or Japanese paper balloons
- for a service or wedding use flower or vegetation garlands as decorations, fabrics as bunting, plant a native tree, light candles or lanterns - which can all be re-used.

# Community Garden







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# Rodenticide poisonings in Pets

With the onset of warmer weather, there seems to be more activity in the rodent world, and this is prompting the more frequent use of rodenticides such as Rat-sac and Talon laid as baits for these unwelcome intruders. Unfortunately rodenticides are rather indiscriminate in what they kill, and this means a significant toll on wildlife as well as domestic pets. Dogs by their food-hoovering nature are the most commonly effected, but our feline friends are equally susceptible to poisoning if they set their minds to it.

There are several types of rodenticide, with the main ones being compounds that act as anticoagulants by inhibiting Vitamin-K dependent clotting factors in the blood. Of these compounds there are First Generation Anticoagulants (like Warfarin) which are generally shorter acting and less toxic, and Second Generation Anticoagulants (like Talon and Tomcat) which are more toxic, persist for longer in the liver and require three to four weeks of antidote therapy.

In spite of directions suggesting that baits are not attractive to pets, the pets don't seem to read these and poisonings are very common. Baits are either left where pets can reach them, or they are poorly concealed from curious pets (especially younger ones). Sometimes baits can be hauled out of a hiding place by enthusiastic rodents, or washed out in heavy rain.

Once ingested, signs of poisoning usually develop within three to five days. Sometimes a toxic dose is built up by eating several smaller doses over several days. Much less commonly, a pet may be poisoned by eating rodents exposed to the toxin.

Treatment for these poisonings revolves around administration of Vitamin K1 for three to four weeks. Regular old K3 tablets are not effective. If ingestion has occurred within a couple of hours, a drug administered to make the patient vomit may minimise, but not eliminate, the ongoing risk. Once symptoms of blood-clotting abnormalities arise things get much more complicated and dangerous.

Symptoms of anticoagulant poisoning include rapid heart rate and pale gums, coughing and difficulty breathing (due to lung bleeding), weakness, subcutaneous bleeding, bleeding from bodily orifices, bleeding into the whites of the eyes, nasal bleeding, black faeces, stroke, swollen joints, a swollen abdomen (full of blood), abortion, exercise intolerance and lethargy. Once symptoms like this develop the situation is grave and will require intensive therapy for blood loss and shock, possibly including blood transfusions and oxygen therapy. Lactating mothers will likely need to have their young supplemented with K1 as well.

Early treatment, as always, is by far the best option. Even if the patient has no obvious symptoms and oral treatment is continued as an outpatient, antidote therapy should be instituted for several weeks with follow-up blood tests to check clotting factors. If tests are still not normal then a further three weeks treatment may be needed. Discontinuing treatment early, even if there are no symptoms, can be a disaster.

To add insult to injury, re-exposure even months to years later, can be a serious problem due to the persistence of second-generation anticoagulants in the liver.

If you suspect your pet may have eaten one of these baits, call the vet immediately as early induction of vomiting can make life a lot easier for everyone. Even if you think your pet may have eaten a toxin a couple of days earlier there's no need to panic. The patient will often be started on VitK1 by injection and then kept on oral K1 for 3 to 4 weeks, with followup blood tests to see if an extended course is needed.

So be aware of this risk, don't let your pets roam, pick up any un-used baits or unprotected baits, and place baits in such a way as to be inaccessible to curious pets.

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



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
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
