PROJECT DELIVERY stage 1



The Lennox Village Vision project aims to improve Lennox Head's village centre while retaining its low-key, social, and coastal village feel. Following extensive community consultation, planning, and concept development, this project kicked off in September 2021. The \$7 million works will be completed in four stages, over two financial years, as funding and grant opportunities become available.

>>> Stage One

Construction commenced in September 2021 and will continue until early 2022 (subject to approvals, weather and site conditions).

This first stage includes:

- Aboriginal cultural heritage investigations
- undergrounding of overhead electrical lines, including connections to properties
- relocation of water services, including connections to properties
- installation of stormwater pollution mitigation devices in Ross Park and Lennox Park.

Ross Park September 2021 - January 2022

The Ross Park concept has been developed after years of engagement from the local community.

The new play space will include an all-ability carousel*, group nest swing, timber fort with slide and natural play elements including a wobbly bridge, balancing poles and a turtle sandpit maze created by local artists. The park also features an accessible toilet, covered picnic areas, shade trees, seating, and 'art pavers' designed by the community in association with the Lennox Arts Board. Ross Park will be closed while these works are being

completed. This will ensure the safety of our community and construction crew while also reducing the overall construction time. To find another park or playground near you, visit *ballina.nsw.gov.au/playgrounds*.

Restricted by COVID, at our 1 November meeting we were pleased to see 12 members face-to-face with apologies from Crs Johnson and Cadwallader.

Loving Seven Mile Beach (7MB). From LH-Alstonville SLSC northwards, 7MB is overloaded. An off-leash dog area, a rare 4WD permissible beach, walkers, surfers, sunbathers, picnickers, fishers, plus environment conservators create a hectic mix in (approximately) the 4ks within Ballina Shire. We have reports of territorial claims such as 'this is a 4WD/dog beach, leave if you don't like it'. Near misses by dangerous drivers, dog attacks, dune and beach damage have been recorded and photographed. Police and Rangers have issued infringements. Council advises improved management options will not be considered before 2022. We implore users to be vigilant, apply shared beach courtesies and report offender details to Council Rangers (6686 1210 or 1300 864 444).

North Creek Road and bridge. With 2028 the potential date for reinstatement of North Creek Road and bridge to Ballina, Council has commenced preliminary studies and surveys southwards between Skennars Head Road intersection and the old bridge site.

Residents' Association looks forward. Our Association covers a range of local issues with credible lines of communication to Council. We invite existing and new members to bring fresh perspectives into 2022 and beyond. It is an exciting time for Lennox and Skennars Heads with Lennox 2022 Centenary, consultation for the Coastal Management Program and Strategic Plan in 2022, then in 2023, North Creek Road and bridge. New residents wishing to help shape the future of our area are invited to join.

Our Christmas meeting on 6 December is a great opportunity to meet your community in a social environment. Business is concise and attendees are invited to bring beverages,


receptacles and shared nibbles of choice. Like our Surfing Santa, we wish you all a Merry Christmas, and The Lennox Wave many more years of success.

Wildlife Wins At Macadamia Castle

It's the beginning of a new era for The Macadamia Castle. The family-friendly tourism attraction was sold to conservation group Wildlife Recovery Australia (WRA) in October. WRA is a joint venture of two-not-for profits - Byron Bay Wildlife Hospital and Odonata Foundation - combining resources to operate mobile wildlife hospitals and predator-proof sanctuaries. It is chaired by economist and passionate wildlife conservationist Dr Ken Henry AC.

Located on 2.7 hectares in Nyangbul Country (Knockrow) and situated in the heart of a biodiversity hotspot, The Macadamia Castle is an ideal location for a wildlife hospital and WRA's national headquarters. The large solar energy system and electric vehicle charging station will provide immediate, clean renewable energy sources for WRA's operations. Dedicated parking and access for wildlife rescue organisations and carers means they can present patients for treatment and care by the veterinary team led by Dr Bree Talbot.

It will also be the departure point for deployment of the Mobile Wildlife Hospital to respond to injured, diseased, traumatised or stranded native animals.

Founder and CEO of Byron Bay Wildlife Hospital and WRA Director Dr Stephen Van Mil, said there are plans to create new visitor experiences for public education about wildlife conservation.

'Offering educational visitor experiences alongside our veterinary and conservation work will help to inform people about the skills, facilities and resources required to give

wildlife the quality care they deserve, said Dr. Van Mil. 'We're investing to improve the retail and hospitality services and will continue to welcome visitors to The Macadamia Castle. By continuing to support and visit, people are contributing to saving wildlife.'

'It costs a lot of money to provide expert veterinary treatment, rehabilitation facilities for wildlife, free of charge. We need ongoing philanthropic donations, private sector capital and public funding to carry out this important work to save wildlife.

'We acknowledge the Nyangbul people of the Bundialung nation, the traditional owners of the land we're going to work from, and are looking forward to learning from their ancient knowledge of caring for Country and the wildlife that inhabits it.'

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Landmarks Of Lennox—Lions Centenary Calendar

2021 is the third year Lennox Head Lions Club has encouraged local photographers to enter the Lens on Lennox competition with top images showcased in the calendar of the following year.

The 2022 calendar is different. It celebrates 100 years since Lennox Head village was first so named at the inaugural 1922 Lennox Head Estate Auction. Together with a winning entry, each month includes two photos reflecting that location at some time in the past 100 years.

January's entry by Margaret Shaw looks north along Seven Mile Beach from Lennox Park. This stretch is where the Ti (Tea) Tree Fence was built by hard working volunteers in the 1967 winter after massive seas tore away metres of sand dunes. It is the only section of beach which has withstood all that nature can throw at it since, retaining its dunes, with the two metre tall fence completely covered.

Glenn Lawlor's November photo of the southern side of Lennox Headland reminds us of the ocean's destructive force. Shag Rock once stood at the northern end of Boulder Beach but in the last 100 years, it reduced from two rocks to one, the last section consumed by the sea in 2012.²

Meet The Wallers

Lennox Head artist Mark Waller's paintings shine with the brilliant natural light the coast is blessed with – illuminating the rich greens of a pandanus leaf, the infinite blues of the ocean and its creatures, and the surfwhite radiance of angels' wings. They are windows into a light-filled world – the one at our back door – and serve to open our eyes to the wonder of life.

Which makes a film about Mark's art – and the at-times harrowing 20-year journey he and his family have undertaken so he can remain true to it – a natural choice for a one-off presentation from the Byron Bay Film Festival (BBFF), whose theme for 2021 is Shining Light in Darkness.

Meet the Wallers is a close-up, courageous study of Waller the artist and the man, his occasionally despairing wife, Nicole, and their two daughters. It's a film about the artistic drive when it has a spiritual intention behind it,

and equally about a marriage and how two dissimilar but madly in love people overcome adversity.

Mark's idealism can be exasperating for Nicole when there are bills to pay, but the joy he gets – and gives – from 'playing with paint' is a gift to us all.

Meet the Wallers is unstinting in showing the cost of following a dream such as making paintings in order to create a ripple effect of kindness in the world – and not finding a buyer. But Mark's paintings are his 'antidotes to smallness' and his work expands and lights up the visible and mythical worlds – and the lives of his family.

The film meets BBFF director J'aimee Skippon-Volke's ambition for this year's festival – pared back by COVID but determined to stake its claim as the region's major cultural event.

'The tagline, Shining Light in Darkness, reflects our intention to present



a program which brings hope and strength to our community and filmmakers after two grim years, J'aimee said.

'Meet the Wallers truly shines light, with a strong message of resilience, trust and hope – things we all need right now.'

Meet the Wallers screens at the Lennox Head Cultural Centre on Friday 17

Jannette Puts Her Crayons Away

It's the end of an era at Lennox Head Community Preschool, with the retirement of long-time director Jannette Leonard.

She's clocked up an impressive 40+ year career since she graduated from an early childhood teaching qualification. In that time she spent 16 years working in Coffs Harbour, 9 years in Grafton and a whopping 21 years in Lennox Head.

Not surprisingly she knows a gazillion local people here and regularly welcomes ex-preschool students back to the school in all sorts of roles.

'We've had the plumber, the electrician and the cabinet maker all come here to do work – and they were ex-preschool kids, who still me remembered me,' she says.

If you ever do a lap of the village with Jannette be prepared—she really knows everyone. And it is clear that she has had a massive personal loving influence on so many little lives. You cannot get more than a few metres without someone big or small greeting Jannette with familiarity and warmth.

These days she's got three even more special little ones to guide: three granddaughters to her two daughters Sophie and Tara. It's an extra special role for Jannette and one she absolutely relishes.

She also has elderly frail parents who live in Stanthorpe who she intends to visit and who may need her help in the next few years.

So she's stepping away, leaving a legacy of growth and nurturing, not only for the kids, but also for the school which has had the benefit of Jannette's calm advocacy and lobbying over the years.

While she is a bit sad to leave before the second preschool is built (a plan in the pipeline with Council), she says 'I could be waiting a long time as things get delayed. I know it's the right time and I'm leaving the place in very good hands.'


The secession plan is very sound: her two qualified and experienced daughters know the job inside out and will share the leadership roles. Jannette has been preparing them for many years.

From Our Own Hard Quiz Champ BY MEL MOTT

I have been a fan of comedian Tom Gleeson for many years. Hard Quiz is one of the few shows I watch on TV.

Over 20 years ago, when my dear friend Marg and I were in executive positions in the Lennox Head All Girls Surfriders Club, we were presented with tee shirts from a Sydney club that had a photo of Duke Kahanamoku on the front and a photo on the back of Isabel Lethem, captioned 'Australia's First Lady of Surf'. I was intrigued - why was the Duke credited with lighting the spark inspiring women to surf in Australia?

At the 1912 Stockholm Olympic Games, Duke beat Australian Cecil Healy for the gold medal in the 100 m freestyle. However, Duke nearly missed the final race due to mistaking the schedule of events. Cecil Healy petitioned the officials to delay the race until Duke could get there, as Duke was the world record holder, and the favourite for the event. Duke was so impressed with this act of sportsmanship, he accepted Cecil's invitation to visit Australia in the future for a series of swimming demonstration events.

The Duke's seminal trip to Australia in the summer of 1914-15 is covered in Phil Jarrett's book *That Summer at Boomerang*. The surfboard that the Duke hand made at the Boomerang camp at Freshwater Beach that summer is still on exhibit at Freshwater SLSC today and is insured for a million bucks!

During the Duke's 1914-15 Australian swimming demonstration tour, he did several surfing demonstrations. As part of some of these he took 15 year old Isobel out for a tandem surf. She went on to inspire other Australian women to do the same, and we all are here because of those pioneers.

In late 2019 *Hard Quiz* had a celebrity special that included intellectual Waleed Aly. I had not long returned from a trip to Hawaii where I had bought a book called *Waterman* by American David Davis, which is the first very detailed and




researched biography of the Duke. I was absolutely amazed at the Duke's character, life and achievements and thought if Waleed can get humiliated on national television for Batman, I can definitely take the heat for the Duke.

So I applied for *Hard Quiz* via the online portal and after several months I was invited to a Zoom audition. Many months later it was confirmed I would be a contestant. By this stage I was wondering what I had got myself into.

All the production staff involved with the show were lovely and looked after us. We did not meet Tom until he walked onto set to start the filming. It was one of the most nerve racking but hilarious and fun experiences of my life.

Oh, and that Big Brass Mug? The perfect ice bucket.



Plan Ahead To Avoid Airport Delays

Residents and visitors are being urged to arrive early at the Ballina Byron Gateway Airport to avoid the inconvenience of traffic delays and parking changes.

Car parking is reduced and changed traffic conditions are in place while the airport carpark is being upgraded.

The community is encouraged to avoid driving to the airport where possible. Consider asking a family member or friend to drop off or pick up at the airport, or use alternative transport options such as taxis and shuttle bus services. For transport alternatives visit ballinabyronairport.com.au/transport-links.

The following traffic and parking arrangements are now in place:

- One-way traffic circulation in the main airport precinct
- Enter the airport turning left at Seven Mile Brewery via Southern Cross Drive
- Exit the airport via the new roundabout on Airport Boulevard, turning right onto Southern Cross Drive
- Set down and pickup areas in front of the terminal
- Rental carparking located in Zones A, B and C (as shown on airport website)
- Taxi/shuttle bus zones situated between the secure overnight carpark and the administration building.

The airport carpark upgrade commenced in August 2021 and is expected to be completed in December 2021 (weather and site conditions permitting).



Ballina Shire Council appreciates parking is in great demand in our town centres. However, to ensure parking is available to everyone, timed parking restrictions are in place.

Please check timed parking restrictions to avoid receiving a Penalty Infringement Notice (PIN). Council Rangers and Parking Officers conduct regular patrols in these areas, including weekends.

Fines in excess of \$117 will be issued for overstaying the posted time limit.

Mobile Phones And Driving – Know The Rules

Most of us know by now that touching or holding a mobile phone while driving in Australia is prohibited. But many of us don't know the extent or detail of the law.

Here's a general rundown of the rules so you don't risk doing the wrong thing.

All around Australia holding or touching a mobile phone while driving is an offence. Each state and territory has its own offences and penalties. The term 'mobile devices' generally includes: mobile phones, tablets, ipods (or other small portable music devices) as well as satellite navigation systems, and the rules for each are different.

You can touch your phone if your phone is connected to the car via Bluetooth or is in securely mounted in an approved mounting device and you are a full license holder. Touching it means you can set the navigation, change the music, or make or receive calls.

No phones for restricted license holders

L-Platers and P-Platers are not allowed to use phones AT ALL while driving, this includes using Bluetooth to stream music – so it's best to make sure your phone is packed away somewhere you won't be tempted to touch it.

L-Platers and P-Platers can use navigation devices though, as long as the navigation is built-in to the car's dash display. Portable navigation systems like Tom Toms must securely mounted in an approved mounting device.

You should also know – and not many people do – that a driver can also be fined if a passenger has a screen anywhere near the driver's line of sight. So, for example, if you have a passenger watching videos in the passenger seat and they lift the device to show the driver something, this is breaking the law.

The rules to mobile device use apply while the car is on the road, so this does include while idling or waiting to pick someone up.

All drivers (including restricted licence holders) can access the wallet or payment function on a phone if they are in a driveway, a carpark or a drive thru.

Driver distraction can kill

The reason that rules are strict and penalties are hefty is, quite simply, because driver distraction is a leading cause of death on our roads. And contrary to popular belief, mobile phone use while driving is not restricted to young offenders. In NSW, 'use mobile device' offence will cost you over \$500 in fines and five demerit point (on a double demerit weekend, that's 10 points!)

Don't think you won't get caught either – the NSW Government has invested heavily in high-definition mobile phone detection cameras, including fixed and transportable cameras. These can detect the movements of a driver in all weather conditions, and they are stationed throughout the state.

Boomerang Bags Christmas Stall

Community group Boomerang Bags Lennox Head will be holding a pre-Christmas stall outside IGA and Cellarbrations on Sunday 12 December from 8am until about 1pm.

We'll be selling Bought to Support bags for \$5 each as well as a few new non-bag items this year: beeswax wraps made from recycled fabric (various sizes), produce bags (for a gold coin donation), colourful bunting (\$15 each, a plastic-free alternative to party decorations) and Christmas sacks for presents. Proceeds go back into the community: to cover sewing machine repairs for our volunteers and to support local charities such as Australian Seabird Rescue and Lennox Community Gardens.

Our Boomerang Bags group (it's a worldwide phenomenon now) was set up in 2017 to make reusable shopping bags from recycled fabric to reduce plastic pollution in and around town.

We make two kinds of bags: Bought to Support (\$5) and Borrow & Reuse (free to borrow and return when you don't need it any more). Both are available at two outlets in Lennox: Nixon's Bulk Foods and Seed & Husk. They make great Christmas presents.

We're always happy for more people to join us; bring your own sewing machine or use one of ours. There are plenty of nonsewing jobs too: ironing, screenprinting, sorting bags for sale, folding fabric. We meet on the first and third Saturday of every month (except January) at the CWA hall in Mackney Lane. 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


been running it has already launched several careers.



Title: Off the Charts by Georgie Carroll

Are you looking for a quick, easy read by an infectiously funny Australian author? This new release biography by straighttalking nurse and comedian, Georgie Carroll, is just that!

In *Off the Charts*, Carroll lets you peek behind the curtains to see the inner workings of a hospital. Taking us ward to ward, limb to limb, stitch to stitch, Carroll does not hold back as she shows us the human fragility and fierceness she sees every day at work.

Born in Manchester, England, and now a proud Australian, Georgie Carroll reflects on how the combination of nationalities, home life, and hospital created a training ground that nurtured her humour.

Numerous anecdotes litter this biography, with a few personal favourites

that provided laugh-out-loud moments. From labelling nurse ranks as aquatic animals and the failed camping trip with her mother and her sons, to her propaganda towards aqua-aerobics and its benefits, this is a celebration of the frontline nurses who, sooner or later, play a huge role in all our lives.

And at our Lennox Head Cultural Centre, the Creedence Clearwater Revival show will take you on another walk down memory lane.







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Lynn Thorndycraft is Ms December

It's quite a challenge to wrap Lynn Thorndycraft's life neatly into a short article. She's a woman of many talents and interests and she's been dealt some serious challenges along the way.

But the backdrop to Lynn's varied life has always been her spiritual journey. She is a qualified Reiki practitioner and light worker, published poet, philosopher, near-death-experience (NDE) survivor, community volunteer and believes that we are all One.

'We are all spiritual beings', she says, 'but some of us don't acknowledge or practise that in our daily lives.'

Lynn says she has brought all her kids up with a spiritual grounding. And what does that mean?

'Well it's almost a form of anarchy, really. You need to be struck by a "thiscan't-be-all-there-is" moment. Once you realise you don't have the full picture

and that there is so much more that you don't know or understand, then you stop buying into the stories that are fed to us. The materialism and judgementalism—the conversation that says you are only worth anything if you are powerful/wealthy.

'For me, that realisation came at a dark time in my life and I was drawn to *The Road Less Travelled* by Scott M Peck, followed by *You Can Heal Your Life* by Louise Hay and that began my journey towards a spiritual education.

'Now, I understand that the most important things in life are how well you have loved, and how well you have let love in. This is true wealth.'

As Lynn established this spiritual context for her life, she was to receive some big life tests.

Lynn's first-born Kai was diagnosed with a severe to profound bilateral, sensory neural hearing loss when he was only a few months old, and was fitted with hearing aids at just six months. He was also later diagnosed with Asperger's and dyslexia. Around that time her mother also passed away.

Next child Zali, who was born three years later, had full hearing, but Maya, who was born two years after that, was also profoundly deaf and fitted with hearing aids as a baby.

'They were very difficult days. I was attending speech therapy sessions, Itinerant support sessions for the deaf, Riding for the Disabled, hearing aid appointments, geneticists, liaising with schools, teachers and support workers, supporting the kids' learning at home while educating myself with the deaf community and I became a full-time carer,' says Lynn.

As her father and sister lived in Sydney, Lynn often looked to her friends and local community for support. Her years of volunteering at Op shops, Meals On Wheels and supporting orphanages overseas she puts down to her own parents and grandparents' influence—they were all members of community organisations and gave their time in service.

As to her poetry, well that can be traced to her father and grandfather, who were both poets.

'I had always written poems for friends and cathartically for myself, and eventually I had quite a collection. I put them together in 2014 and self-published *Back To Grace* which I updated and reprinted in 2018.'



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In 2010 Lynn established a Facebook/Instagram page called Earthschool Harmony, where she shares philosophical thoughts and observations from the great thinkers and poets of our time. She has a massive 115,000 organic followers and frequently sees posts go viral, reaching millions. It's a time-consuming passion which brings her joy.

'I'm actually an introvert, but Earthschool Harmony is my way of giving and connecting globally with like-minded thinkers.'

What's the best thing about your life? Family, friends and Community.

Worst thing? That life won't be long enough to fit everything in.



Kane Shields has great memories of a free-wheeling Lennox Head childhood.

When his family moved from out west to Lennox, he made the most of the beachside lifestyle—riding bikes, surfing, hanging at the beach, eating hot chips, and generally doing what teenage boys do when they hang out together.

Kane attended Holy Family and Xavier schools and when he left school, he scored a job at a herb nursery in Byron Bay, where he still works to this day.

On the big day the performers are required to get to the centre at 11 am, but don't go on until 7. Kane says he doesn't get nervous before shows, but he does sometimes get frustrated with the long wait to go on.

'With Strong, I'm not worried at all because it's my piece and I know it off by heart. But it is a big responsibility.' As to the whole night's performance,

Kane says the dancers have been working very hard at rehearsals, learning the moves for a series of technical pieces, which require a high degree of effort and concentration.

'I always loved to dance,' says Kane. 'It makes me feel free and happy and it keeps me fit.'

'But I don't like rehearsing. They really push us to the limit, and then when it comes to the big night, we always smash it,' he says.

Now I get to lead something – that feels like a professional achievement.

Chantal Jephcote is a young Lennox Head mother with an 18 month old daughter and eight-year-old step son. She's an accredited exercise physiologist with 10 years experience, an injury management health advisor and clinical pilates instructor (8 years).

Chantal has been in the area for the past five years and moved to Lennox Head three years ago to settle down with her partner who came to Lennox more than 15 years ago. Chantal's niche area is Women's Health, particularly pregnancy and post partum.

'Since working in this area and being a mum myself now I'm astonished about how many women don't rehabilitate properly after birth and then have serious physical and health issues down the track.

'My aim is to promote a return to exercise safely post birth and to rehabilitate correctly to avoid issues later on such as diastasis recti, pelvic floor issues, lower back and hip pain.'

Chantal's Mamas at HOME Pilates program has just reached its first birthday. It is an online program that helps mothers to safely rehabilitate through the post partum period and return to exercise safely. The program is run through LIVE and catch up sessions run virtually to fit in with busy lifestyles.

Chantal is also launching a Pilates in pregnancy stream in



January 2022 focussing on pelvic floor, safe core and getting ready for baby and birth.

This year Chantal is a finalist for Exercise Physiologist of the Year 2021 through Exercise and Sports Science Australia (ESSA) for demonstrating excellence in the profession. The winner will be announced in mid December.

Remy Remembers

We couldn't possibly publish a 200th special issue without talking to the person responsible. We had a chat with Remy Tancred about her memories and passion for publishing.

What was your career experience that made you consider starting your own magazine?

My first job was with *Time Magazine*, *WHO Weekly* and, back then, *Sports Illustrated*. All three titles were Time Warner publications. I started working with Time on Level Five and I always found Level Seven where *WHO* was much more interesting. So after six months at Time a job came up working in the marketing department at *WHO* for the Associate Publisher and I took that and pretty much learnt everything from that job. Some of the people in our department were tough to work with but it gave me a strong work ethic and taught me how not to take shit from people.

Who did you start it with?

I met my husband in Sydney and he was from Lennox Head. When we decided to marry and have kids it was where we wanted to be. I landed a job at NBN Television in Lismore where I met Annie Lewis. She was an incredible journalist and a fun professional who also lived in Lennox. I was only working a few days a week there and was keen to do something else. We had a chat in the office kitchen one day and the rest is history.

What do you remember about Lennox Head in 2003?

So much! The street shops stopped at where the Bakery is now. The Bakery was a small convenience shop. The newsagency and bottleshop were where LeChelle is now. It was fun to go to get your wine at the bottleshop on a Friday afternoon and come home two hours later! They had great after work drinks on sometimes.

Nick's (my husband's) grannie Clare would take us all to Tracey and Marcels - 7 Mile Cafe which is now Shelter. Fond memories made there and exceptional wines too.

How did the business community respond to your idea when you first approached them?

We had thought it would be great to




start with a small magazine and grow but every business wanted to advertise. In issue one we had 20 pages and by issue 3 we had 32 and it just kept growing. We have so many great community groups and sporting clubs that made important contributions and it's great to see they still do today.

What do you think was the secret to your success as publisher for 100 issues?

Loving what I did. I have always enjoyed working, creating new things and *The Wave* was no exception. Having a strong community backing from the beginning was a huge part of the success.

Property Pandemonium

Watching property prices go off the richter

It's a cliché now and, no doubt the talk at the pub and barbeques. The story of the property explosion in Lennox Head and other regional coastal towns, is one that *The Lennox Wave* has watched with interest.

Local solicitor and conveyancer Adam Gibbs from S + P Lawyers remembers that even in the late 90s, 'Lennox was still a sleepy little village and Pacific Parade was just a row of shacks.'

The place got very busy at Christmas and Easter, but at other times of the year not much was happening, and everyone who had a job had to go to Lismore or the Gold Coast to work. There were very few professional jobs here—and not many tradies back then.

'We saw blocks selling at the bottom of Montwood Drive for \$30,000.

'I think the NBN was the biggest influence on the town's growth. It meant that people could work remotely and that created the boom.'

Elders Real Estate Principal Michael

King, who started his career at Elders with Don and Judy Ironfield in 1997, recalls life as a real estate agent without mobile phones or internet.

'We used to take photos with a small instamatic camera and then take them to the shop to get hard copy prints made. We'd always get two sets printed—one for the window of the agency and one to send away to the newspaper for the advertising.'

'We've been lucky to benefit from this incredible property boom. We've been blessed to raise a family here.'

Says Lois Buckett, "I've never seen anything like this growth in my 30-year career. Not only have we witnessed a steep increase in prices, but that increase has been sustained.

'COVID has pushed people out of the cities and made competition for regional property increase. Stocks are low and people are hestitant to sell because they fear they will not be able to get back in.

'So some locals have been able to take advantage of the situation, others are hanging on, and some are being forced to move.'

Kent Shay agrees that the growth has been 'quite unbelievable, especially over the past two years.

'History has shown that it can't keep going, but it's always going to be a place that people want to live. So prices will remain high.'







Green Turtles on Seven Mile Beach

That's right folks, they're here, Green, Hawksbill and Loggerhead turtles are all locals around Lennox Head and guess what? - they've been here for more than 100 million years.

You'll often see Green turtles swimming in the Boat Channel and the Bream Hole but you might be surprised to know that they sometimes nest on Seven Mile Beach too. If you're really lucky, you might just see their tell-tale crawls on the sand because they generally nest at night between November and January.

The Queensland coast and the Barrier Reef islands are their usual haunts but they've nested here before and in 2020, 19 sites were located on the Far North Coast, so there's a good chance they might nest again this year on Seven Mile Beach.

Hatching occurs from January to March and it's an uphill struggle from the get-go for these tenacious little reptiles. First, they must pry their way to the surface through soft sand (this often takes hours), then orient themselves toward the sea, run the gauntlet of predators and avoid the baking summer sun. Problems lie everywhere. Birds, goannas, foxes and wild dogs all take a toll. Off-leash domestic dogs also pose a problem.

Four-wheel-drive vehicles also present a hazard. They can easily destroy an entire nest so it's vitally important to stay well away from the foredune. Even deep tyre tracks can obstruct hatchlings causing them to crawl along the tracks rather than directly into the sea. And then there are the sea predators and floating plastics; it's no wonder only



one in a thousand hatchlings make it to reproductive age.

And here are some other interesting facts about Green turtles:

- · Their eggs are ping pong ball-sized
- They don't reproduce until 40-45 years old
- Female hatchlings emerge from warm nests, males from cool nests
- Some turtles come from as far away as the Solomon Islands, PNG and Noumea
- They can stay under water for two to three hours
- Their fatty tissue is pale green due to the chlorophyll in the seaweed they eat.

And, a few friendly Green turtle tips. They don't like being disturbed while laying so please stay well away if you see one. Keep four-wheel-drive vehicles well below high tide level or better still, consider not driving on Seven Mile Beach between November and March. Youngsters emerge between January and March, so leash your pooch before it pounces.

Green turtles can only survive and return

to Seven Mile Beach to nest again if we consider their safety first. After all, it's their beach too.

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Ocean Rhythms

STEVE SHEARER

As you've probably noticed with all the wet stuff falling out of the sky, our running commentary on the possibility of La Nina returning this summer has now been made official by the Bureau of Meteorology. For our corner of sub-tropical NSW that has meant a series of troughs and a mostly onshore pattern with small, weak surf. In other words, nothing at all to get excited about.

Small windows of cleaner conditions have been getting fewer and further between in amongst the general onshore wind pattern and that pattern is likely to continue into the short/ medium term. Expect a wet Christmas. If you can adjust the mind-set to deal with scrappier surf the medium/long range forecasts all suggest a fair whack of E'ly swell as tradewind bands set up in the Coral Sea and near South Pacific. These swells are likely to arrive with E through SE winds so to find anything protected will mean tucking in behind a more northerly oriented headland like Cape Byron.

Of course the major curve ball in this scenario is a tropical cyclone. Current sea surface temperature charts show the Northern Coral Sea up into Papua New Guinea and across to the Solomon Islands getting very much like hot pea soup and already some low pressure development is occurring. It's



been a long while since a Christmas cyclone in the Coral Sea but considering the current La Nina it's definitely on the cards. Watch this space.

We're still stuck between seasons are far as fishing goes. The East Australian Current has been flowing, but mostly out wide, with inshore temps still a bit cool to fire up summer species. The rain will provide a minor flush for the estuary which should see fishing improve in the medium term, especially once the water starts to really warm up. A few whiting and dart have been about on the beaches, but better fishing days lie ahead for those species as water warms up, assuming we don't get a flood of course, in which case all bets are off.

Have a great Xmas, till next year, tight lines and tubular visions.


LW – Ha ha, yes, the unique car owner's struggle. So it sounds like you are keeping it for a while.

It's a good idea to check the signs in public places to see if dogs are allowed in that location as a penalty infringement notice can exceed \$330.

- Gap Road, Alstonville
- Seven Mile Beach, Lennox Head north of surf club

- The Spit, Ballina

These areas are not for the exclusive use of dogs and their owners. Please be considerate of all other users by bagging your dog poo, then bin it or take it with you, ensure your dog is always under your effective control, responds to your command and remains close to you. Immediately remove your dog if it shows any sign of anti-social behaviour or aggression.

Dog 'No-Go Areas:

- Shelly Beach, East Ballina
- Lighthouse Beach, East Ballina
- The Serpentine, East Ballina
- Shaws Bay, East Ballina
- Chickiba Lake, East Ballina, north/eastern corner surrounding migratory and shorebirds roosting area
- Flat Rock reef, Skennars Head
- Sharpes Beach, Skennars Head, northern end during surf patrols
- Seven Mile Beach, Lennox Head (south of beach access track located just north of Surf Club)
- Lake Ainsworth and surrounding foreshore/reserve
- Fire Trail end of Camp Drewe Road, Lennox Head

Unwelcome Guest

Recently I had cause to call The Snake Catcher when an unwelcome eastern brown snake decided to sun himself near the rock retaining wall beside my pool.

I contemplated whether to simply leave him alone and hope that he was passing through, but my two kelpies were intent on helping him on his way which I suspected could ended very badly.

Thirty minutes later, I watched from a safe distance as Jack Hogan from Snake Catchers Northern Rivers 24/7, expertly transferred the resistant intruder into a big black bag and assured me the coast was clear. Jack was quite unphased, but I must admit my heart was racing.

Catching the snake was one thing but my next concern was where Jack intended relocating him and whether he would endeavour to make his way back to my yard. I've been told that snakes are territorial.

It turns out that there are many myths surrounding snake behaviour that are unfounded, and Jack was a wealth of information.

For example, I learned that snake 'catching' requires training in the handling of venomous snakes as well as a special license issued by NSW Parks and Wildlife. Snake catchers are required to keep extensive records of the snake species, where they are caught and where they are relocated, all of which is compiled as data on snake numbers and habitat.

Jack's licence stipulates where snakes are to be relocated within a specific radius of where they are caught so that the habitat and food sources are consistent, otherwise the snake might not adapt.

If a snake is found to be injured (most often by domestic cats), Jack takes it to the Byron Bay Wildlife Hospital for treatment before releasing it back in to the wild.

The most reassuring aspect of my conversation with Jack was that snakes do not possess 'homing instincts', in fact they can't even hear.

Their forked tongue flicking in and out tells them the direction in which there is food or water and that's about as complicated as it gets. If they are released where these are abundant then the snake will happily take up residency there and not venture elsewhere until it's time to find a mate.

Ultimately what I came away with was, that although a reptile might not be a cute, cuddly animal, they nonetheless play a vital role in the ecosystem and, as such, deserve our respect and conservation efforts.

Christmas Message For Pet Owners'

Well its time for my annual list of warnings about the silly season and its impact on our pets. Whilst there is always a vet available at emergency facilities, it's best to minimise the likelihood of unintended visits or last minute checkups if possible.

- 1 Make sure all pets have effective and up to date tick and flea prevention. By this I mean a product recommended by a vet and is applied as directed and within the advised time interval. Any homeopathic, acoustic tag, herbal product or similar that claims to prevent tick paralysis will be worse than useless.
- 2 Make sure all pets are up to date with their vaccinations. We see a lot of kennel cough brought into the area in the holidays. Cat flu is also more common when cats are mingling in spring and summer. Canine Parvo disease is more common in summer, and it's a devastating disease that can be easily prevented. Most boarding establishments won't accept pets not vaccinated at least 10 days prior to their stay.
- 3 Don't get caught out by pets coming into heat or getting pregnant due to misjudging their maturity or season. Don't wait till the last minute to desex your pets.
- 4 Make sure you're on top of any recurrent or seasonal problems such as skin and ear issues, and that you are up to date with any chronic meds such as heart medications. It's awkward to try and sort out ongoing complex issues at the last minute when a lot of vets are closed.
- **5** Prepare for the anxiety that many pets feel with an influx of noisy visitors, especially children and other visiting pets. Many pets don't cope well at all and may need medical assistance and need a safe area where they can find refuge from the crowd.
- 6 Make sure pets are identified, microchipped and registered, and that all contact details are up to date.
- 7 Don't let pets roam anywhere, anytime. Dogs should be leashed at all times (except in designated areas or your own property). Apply harnesses and leashes properly. A loose leash that hangs around a dogs neck like a string of pearls (this is a classic) is pretty useless, as is a knackered old leash that snaps at the first sign of excitement. Cats should be kept

indoors at night to minimise their predatory behaviour and contact with disasters such as cars, feral cats, snakes and cane toads.

8 Be aware of the potential dangers of pets ingesting various objects and poisons. Dangerous substances include grapes, raisins, saltanas, onions, garlic, chocolate, fatty meals and scraps, large quantities of ham, cooked bones, cannabis, ibuprofen, human prescription medications, macadamia nuts, rotten garbage etc. Xylitol is an artificial sweetener found in many sweets, ice cream, cakes etc and it is lethal to dogs even in small amounts.

Pets (especially young ones) are also fond of eating wrapping, ribbon, fish hooks, string, toys, spoons, kebab sticks, undies and socks. Keep an eye out for potential disasters!

- **9** Be aware of the risk of cane toads, insect bites, allergies. and snake envenomation especially in the early evenings. Summer is a peak time for all these things, as well as unusual injuries such as eye ulcers from running onto sharp grasses or insects like stink bugs and back injury from enthusiastic holiday activity.
- 10 Watch out for heat stroke—especially common in shortfaced breeds, overweight animals, or elderly pets. It can kill a pet in 20 minutes and its devastating and difficult to treat. Keep your pets cool, don't leave them in cars and avoid exercising your at-risk pets at the middle or end of the day.
- 12 Watch out for old, slow, deaf pets when visitors arrive. These are the guys that have a kip under the car and get run over when everyone is waving goodbye and backing down the driveway after a Chrissy visit.
- 13 Think ahead to avoid potential trauma from meeting unsavoury dogs on off-leash beaches, sharp objects, fishing boxes, inappropriate food and bones left lying about, unusual exercise leading to injuries (eg chubby middle aged dogs going for a run on the beach and rupturing their cruciate ligaments), falling off decks, running onto sharp thrown sticks etc. All these things seem to increase in holiday time.

Hmm that was a jolly old message. There is a 24-hour service available over all the holiday season, shared amongst the local vet clinics, the North Coast Emergency Vets, and Animal Emergency Service.






